Strengthening the work of Scripture Union in Fiji

Apart from the enormous privilege we have to serve the King of kings through this great ministry, we have many testimonies of our work. The challenges are many and yet, we continue to see by God's grace, the impact of this ministry through our students in schools and many more who have left school and today serve in different capacities. In 2013, we celebrated SU Fiji's 50 Anniversary and we reminisced about how this ministry as a vision and a dream took form and grew to where it is today because people saw that vision and supported it. Our 50 years has been mixed with powerful breakthroughs as well as great struggles particularly financial [see testimony on Pg 5] as we worked towards taking the Gospel into our schools. However God has blessed this ministry with great people. They have been our backbone and our inspiration as we serve God unselfishly with our time, wealth and talents. These are the heroes, men, women and young people who dared to serve at personal expenses, because of the outreach of this ministry into their own lives. It is the easier road to just let the churches or other people to do this work, but then we know at Scripture Union that we carry the testimony of many people who have found life, and purpose in Christ Jesus because someone at some point became God's voice, through Scripture Union. Today we continue to serve through Scripture Union, not because it is a duty or a job, but because it is a ministry that God is still using to point many young people back to the cross. It is this reason and more that we continue to strengthen our work.

Our people serving with Scripture Union

A few changes have taken place within the Scripture Union Council this month. Our long time Council Member and Chairman of two terms, Mr. Sitiveni Kalou stepped down from the position to pursue a political office come the September elections [see page 5]. Stepping into the position is the current Vice Chairman, Romulo

Nayacalevu. The Scripture Union Council' key role amongst others is to provide advise and direction for Scripture Union Fiji. Two months ago, our legal advisor, Mr. Filimoni Vosarogo stepped down from the position [see May newsletter] and has since been replaced by Ms. Laurel Vaurasi. Also stepping down is Council Secretary Ms. Fine Ditoka and Council member, Mr. Semi Momoedonu.

Mr. Vosarogo, Mr. Kalou and Ms Ditoka are part of a new political party, *One Fiji* that have registered and will be part of the September National elections. While Scripture Union acknowledges the valuable role that these individuals have

contributed to its work and is saddened that they have resigned from the ministry, we are excited that they are standing for elections at an important time for our nation's political transition. At a time when secular State is a much discussed topic and the debates on whether we should be a Christian nation or not, we take some guidance from Psalms 33:12 "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord, the People He has chosen as His inheritance." Because of the importance of godly people in national politics, we are excited that many who have come through SU are looking at serving in some of this country's highest national positions. Former US President Theodore Roosevelt said, "I believe that the next half century will determine if we advance the cause of Christian civilization or revert to the horrors of brutal paganism". We are praying for the national elections.

These include hitching on the road, or walking in the hot sun or riding a bumpy carrier on their way to some remote schools. Further they are not paid by Scripture Union, yet their hearts are passionate about

Sigatoka rally draws in a crowd

About 80-100 students from Nasikawa Vision College, Rt Latianara High School and Sigatoka Methodist High School converged at Nasikawa Vision College for the Sigatoka schools SU rally on Saturday, 19 July. The Speaker, Basden College Principal and Council Member Mst Mika spoke on the topic, Jesus cares for you and many students were not only encouraged by the mes-

sage but enjoyed the Saturday program. Some felt that conviction and responded to the altar call, still many more went forward as they began to reconnect with Christ as Lord and Savior. SWG volunteers, Keni Baro, Ilisoni Taginadavui and Peni Dovi, drove down to Sigatoka to be part of the program and reported positively of this gathering. This is also the first rally for Sigatoka schools inspired by its Christian teachers who felt that leading to organize this important event. SU has also held rallies for Central/Eastern schools this year with other events planned in different zones before the main Camp.

National Director visits Vanua Levu schools.

Mr. Teilai visited schools in Bua, Lekutu, Dreketi and Labasa areas. The purpose of the visit was to two fold. One to visit existing SUIS programs and the other to discuss with Principals about SUIS with the hope that they will agree to having SUIS in their schools. At Bua College, over 100



Testimonies: From Scripture Union to National Politics

On the 7th of July, Mr. Sitiveni Kalou stepped down as Chairman of the Scripture Union Council to pursue his political ambitions. From Bureta in Ovalau and vasu ni Oneata, Mr. Kalou is the eldest son of the late Minister for Education, Mr. Joeli Kalou. His interest for politics obviously stems from the influences of his late father, his desire to serve in the national arena and of course the new brand of politics he will bring with him come the elections. However this testimony is not focussed on Mr Kalou's political ambitions, rather his faith, that has seen him through some of Scripture Union's toughest challenges.

For many reading about our testimonies and the great work of this Ministry, we may think that it has always



been smooth sailing at SU, however the realities has been, a lot of prayers, meetings and strategies to turn the financial situation of this ministry around. In the forefront of that is Siti, who apart from serving as SWG President was elected in Council, served as its Vice Chairman and Chairman and was involved in the planning to turn Scripture Union from debt into financial stability. His involvement with SU can be traced back to SU's Annual Camp in 1992, where as a form 5 student, he gave his life to the Lord. Since then, there has been no turning back for Siti as he continued to serve in the ranks of

Scripture Union, years on after that turning point in his life. He has also seen some of SU's most challenging years particularly as he served as Chairman. On the financial struggles of the ministry. "I reminded myself everyday of the reason (s), I got involved in the first place. I asked God to help me see things and people through His perspective. It helped me through the good and the not-so-good times." Siti adds about his many years of service with

Scripture Union.



As Vice Chairman, he has had to represent SU in court to answer charges of the financial woes of the ministry. But going through that experience and with the determination of Council members, the work of reversing the debts of SU really began about 3-5 years ago. As Council Chairman, Sitiveni continued to lead the ministry's efforts to ensure that SU is debt free. In 2012 the ministry's debt stood at more than \$5,000. When he resigned, the ministry's bank account was recording a healthy balance

of \$5000 which will allow us to meet the ministry costs at least for the next 3 months. "Whatever the present or the future challenges, I believe that God has placed people in the Ministry who is able to meet them" Siti adds. The impact of the work of Scripture Union is felt by many who were part of SUIS. Many, like Siti remember when they gave their heart to Jesus Christ through SU's programs and these are the testimonies of the impact of this Ministry as it takes the Great Commission into schools and to families. Further partner-



ship with local churches is important and Siti believes that, "the development and maintenance of a strong, committed and engaged partnership with the wider Church and its members is key to the viability and sustainability of SU; not only as a going concern but more importantly as an effective vehicle for the Great Commission." Stepping into national leadership is an obvious path for Sitiveni Kalou whose own life is a testimony of godly leadership, commitment, passion and integrity. SU wishes Mr. Kalou well in his endeavours.
