

A lot of young people today are challenged by society, family and peer pressure and have various coping mechanisms to try and deal with these issues. What is certain is that teenage depression, suicide amongst young people, alcohol and drug abuse, teenage pregnancies, crime amongst young people etc. are all on the rise. And the church and ministries like SU need to strengthen our efforts in addressing it, speaking to the heart of young with the life changing message of Jesus Christ.

Unpacking the tough questions, confronting young people issues

It was a packed room as campers flocked to the Q & A session at the 2012 Annual Camp. A panel from some of Scripture Union's finest leaders, including SU Pacific Coordinator, Mr. Sam Emery, Council Members Ms Fine Ditoka and teacher, Mr. Talemo Waqa, and Assistant Principal at Suva Grammar School, Master Mika Mudreilagi, USP Counsellor, Mr. Nicholas Fuata, Missionary and YWAM staff, Ms Sera Cirikiyasawa, Western SU Coordinator and flight attendant, Mr. Petero Cakau responded to these question asked by students with references to their personal testimonies of their own experiences as well as from the Word of God. Some of the questions asked by campers included;

- "After giving my life to Christ and if I sin, will I loose my salvation"
- "What can I do to improve my relationship with my parents"
- "Does the Holy Spirit exist?
- "Is it okay to backslide"?
- "I have a really close friend who drinks alcohol and is a Christian. How can I approach her about it?"
- "How can I learn to trust God"?
- "Is it okay to date someone at 17?
- "I once heard that we should not blame others especially God on what wrong things that we have done or the sins we have committed. But it is clearly written in the Bible that nothing happens by mistake and it is according to His plans alone. I am asking for more clarification on this which often confuses me."
- "How can you know that God is speaking to you?"
- "How can I be constant in my relationship with God?"
- "Why should Eve's sin make all mankind suffer?"
- "God is love, why should a loving God send people to Hell?"
- How can we control lust?"







breakfast theme from BMS and journey with our campers together with their creativity, fun and just colourful display of innocence, and good fun. For Christianity to remain relevant for young people, it is important for the church to speak in a language of young people as well as in a tone they understand. The Bible reminds us that we should teach a child in the way they should go so that when they grow up, they shall not depart from it. The difference between

We must teach our young people that the Christ is still relevant today than He has ever been. These questions reveal a deeper longing for Truth amongst young people. At this camp were students struggling with addictions, smoking, alcohol, drugs, relationships, Christianity and sexual issues. Suffice to say, that most if not all were Christians from strong Christian backgrounds and yet, faced these challenges that go to the root of their faith. The Panel dissected the issues and were able to answer some of these tough questions with references from the Bible. Evident from this session is that many young people are struggling with these issues and need to sit down and talk with someone who can hold them accountable to themselves and especially to God.

The rise in teenage pregnancies

Hospital statistics show that teenage pregnancy is on the rise. A November 4 2013 news article in the Fiji Times stated that, sexual assault amongst teenagers is a major contributor to high rate of teenage pregnancies in Fiji". This week, the Fiji Times again confirmed that a total of 57 teenage pregnancy cases have been reported to the Ministry of Social Welfare. And a 2011 new article by the Fijilive website records a similar concern by the Ministry of health expressing their concern with the increase in number of girls below the age of 15 getting pregnant. MOH statistics showed that 15 girls under the age of 15 fell pregnant in 2009, 9 for 2008 and 2007, 13 for 2006, 18 for 2005 and 8 for 2004. This triggers the guestion of how can we as the church and ministry address this glaring concern of children becoming parents. SU as a ministry is also concerned and has played a role in its camps and fellowship times to remind students about the importance of making right decisions and choices. The importance of seeking God and living for Him, shunning pre-martial sex until marriage and keeping the marriage bed undefiled and are empowered to say No.



Prayer and Quite time: Two key ingredients in growing in Christ

Master Mika Mudreilagi, the current Principal of Basden College, shared about Prayer and Quite time at the 2012 Annual Camp. Challenging young people about the value of their Christian life and to really grow into spiritual maturity, the importance of reading the Bible and praying cannot be overemphasised. Apart from teaching on prayer and quite time, early mornings are dedicated to campers having their own quite time. Some of the campers found that this was the first time for them to really pray and read their Bible or just spending Quite time with the Lord. Parents and Guardians must realise that family devotion and prayer times are crucial if not important time for the family to get together and encourage each other on the importance of prayer and the Word on any Christian's life especially in their children's life. Unless we realise the importance of quite time and practice it as a daily habit, we will not grow into spiritual maturity. Master Mika discussed this topic from a practical Christianity point of view and was well received by the students. This session or its practicality will be a feature again in this year's camp as campers are required each morning to do their Quite Time before the day's program begins.

The Internet and Pornography; Public Prosecutor shares about the dangers of the internet if left unchecked.



DPP lawyer, Seini Puamau shared about the dangers of an unguarded internet usage that leads to pornography and its lure of false pleasure at the expense of ones spiritual death. Including this topic at the 2012 Annual Camp, the camp leaders felt that the abuse of the internet and its easy accessibly endangers a lot of young peo-

ple who are often left exposed to these unwarranted site. According to the BYU Edu statistics, pornography is a US\$57 billion dollar industry with child pornography generating \$US3 billion annually. Pornography has a way of capturing young minds. It is a known fact that with mobile phones and internet accessibility, students are now sending pornographic images around through their phone. Tragic and sad, this will continue to be a real threat amongst our children, unless we start speaking about its dangers, from the pulpit and in the classrooms. The greatest tragedy is that pornography can strangle one's Christian life and kill them spiritually if they are not grounded in the Word. As a lawyer, Seini's talk provided the perspective of not just the spiritual dangers of pornography but also the legal implications around it. It was a great session and campers shared that they were encouraged and blessed by the presentation. The main question now for parents is do you know what your children are doing on the internet and if not, then they must be extra vigilant about it?
